A Brief History of Henry James Cambie Secondary School

Cambie Secondary School has a long history in Richmond, which can be traced back to 1928. The school was named after Henry James Cambie, who was a member of the survey team that built the local railroad in 1920. From 1928 to 1952, the school was located on Sexsmith Road and was originally known in this area as the first Richmond High. In 1952, the school was officially renamed Cambie Junior Secondary School. In 1995, the new (and current) facility opened as H. J. Cambie Secondary School.

Cambie Secondary has one of the oldest and richest traditions of any school in Richmond. The school has served the northeast portion of Richmond well and provides exceptional academic, athletic, and artistic opportunities for all. We are glad that you are joining the

Cambie Student Services

Counselling Department – Mrs. Koo (last names A-L), Mrs. Wilding (last names M-Z)

Cambie Counsellors are available to help with personal challenges, program planning, career planning and/or personal support. Students are encouraged to see their counsellor for assistance in all areas of school or personal life.

Students can get help from their counsellor by visiting the counselling center during break times or by leaving a note. Parents are also welcome to contact their child's counsellor. Just call the school at 604-668-6430 or email cambie@sd38.bc.ca to make an appointment. The counsellors organize the students they work with based on students' last names (see above).

The Cambie Counselling Department also runs a group of leadership students, known as the Cambie Counselling Centre (CCC) Helpers. These energetic and active students are highly involved in key school events throughout the year. Some of these events include: the Post-Secondary Evening, Christmas Fundraising, Cambie Open House, and Transition Activities. These helpers are easily identifiable in their CCC shirts and can often be seen helping out in the Cambie Counselling Centre.

Career Advising - Ms. Millar

Ms. Millar works at Cambie part-time and is available to support students searching for career options, employment opportunities, post-secondary education planning, and access to scholarships and bursaries.

Library Learning Commons - Mrs. Kos (Teacher-Librarian) Ms. Perez (Library Technician)

The Cambie Library is a vibrant, flexible learning space that offers curriculum-oriented non-fiction materials, reference books and encyclopedias, as well as a wide array of fiction titles and magazines. Videos and DVDs are also available for classroom use. The collection, with its range of reading levels, is designed to meet the needs of students and staff doing research projects, independent study, and recreational reading. Computers with internet access are provided for students doing school-related research, and our catalogue is online and can be accessed at home. In addition, students are encouraged to make use of our green screen, white boards, collaboration tables, and 3-D printer. Assistance is always available to students who need help locating resources that will meet their individual needs. The Library Learning Commons is open every day from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.





Pathways Program

Overview

The Pathways Program is an exciting enrichment program that offers an integrated unit of study that combines theme-based, enriched academic courses in:

- English Language Arts
- Social Studies

- Science
- Physical & Health Education

Aside from these enriched courses, the Pathways program offers field trips, leadership in the community, and outdoor education.

This integrated program is focused on creating a challenging and enriched learning environment while developing the skills needed to become the strong, upstanding leaders of the future: creativity, innovation, confidence, adaptability, effective communication skills, resilience, and an understanding of the importance of giving back to your community. Pathways continues in these subject areas in grade 9 & 10.

Selection Criteria

The selection process for this program is based on:

- a desire to pursue leadership opportunities in the school and community
- social maturity and strong interpersonal skills
- academic ability and effective work habits

Students will be required to submit an online application package, which includes a personal statement outlining their interest in the program, an application form, a teacher recommendation checklist, and a current report card indicating a minimum achievement level of C+ in grade 7 (this level of achievement is necessary given the demands of the program). In addition, all applicants will participate in an interview and a team building event with the Pathways team.

Application Process

Application packages must be submitted online by **January 27, 2022.** Interviews, writing & math samples will take place at feeder schools on February 9-10, 2022. A Team Building Activity will take place at Cambie on February 15, 2022. Details are on our website or follow this QR code:

General Information

Attendance

Regular attendance is a legal requirement and is crucial to academic success at school. Therefore, we monitor student attendance closely.

Parents of students who will be absent or late should contact the school office between 7:45 and 8:20 a.m. (604-668-6430) or email cambie@sd38.bc.ca. If the school has not been contacted by first block, administrative assistants or parent volunteers will phone home to check that the student is safely at home with parental permission. For classes missed after first block, an automated call system will contact your home in the evening. When a student is absent without permission, home is contacted. We appreciate parental support in ensuring regular attendance. It is the student's responsibility to contact the teacher to make up missed work.

Lates

Students are expected to arrive on time for all classes. Students who arrive late should report directly to class. If attendance has been sent to the office, the student will be directed to sign in at the office. Students with frequent lates or absences will have their attendance monitored by the administration and their teachers.

Early Dismissal

If students need to leave during the day due to illness, they must report to the office to sign out. At that time, we will contact parents for permission for the student to leave. If a student needs to leave school early for an appointment, he/she must obtain an early dismissal slip from the office.

Costs Associated with Courses

Basic supplies required to fulfill learning outcomes in all courses will be provided to students free of charge. Should a student wish to use other or additional supplies, these may be purchased independently or through the school on a cost-recovery basis. Students will be asked to pay costs in connection with optional field trips.





Provision of Musical Instruments

Music students will be provided an instrument at no cost. The school has a limited collection of instruments and may not be able to supply a student's first choice. Students using school instruments will share them with other students. Arrangements can be made to practice at school or to borrow the instrument according to a schedule that will be arranged with the other student(s) using the instrument. Students may, however, choose to bring their own musical instruments.

Transportation to Cambie

School Bus

Limited bus service is provided free of charge to students living outside the 4.8 km radius of the school. If you think you qualify, contact the school District's Transportation Department at the School Board Office 604-668-7838. A Transportation Request Form must be completed. These forms are available at the school office.

Translink

Cambie is on the regular Translink bus route. The bus schedule to this area of Richmond coordinates closely with our start and end times.

Food Services

Students can buy breakfast and lunch at school. A broad range of wholesome food items is available throughout the day.

Vending machines that dispense a variety of beverages and snack items are also located in the rotunda. Careful selection of food types based on personal dietary needs is strongly recommended. Students may only purchase food during break times.

There is also a drop-in breakfast club for anyone who wants a little bit of breakfast in the morning. This is coordinated by the SEVA Club and previously the Cambie Counselling Center helpers.





Student Agendas

It is strongly recommended that students consistently use the student agenda provided by the school. It is an invaluable resource for school information, school rules, study skills, and academic information. Most importantly, it includes a daily planner for keeping track of homework and test dates. Students will also have the option to use the MySchoolDay App as a digital student agenda. Note: Hardcopy agendas are only available to grade 8 students (with some exceptions).

Lockers and Locks

At the beginning of the school year each student is assigned a locker for storage of personal items required at school. This will be your locker for the entire school year.

A sturdy combination lock should be used to secure your locker (no key locks). Locks can be purchased from the school or students may bring their own. All students record their lock combination with their homeroom teacher so if they forget their combination they can retrieve it easily.

There are also general-purpose lockers in the gymnasium area for use during P.E. classes and team practices. It is important to note that many students use these lockers, so they must be cleaned out daily. If you store items in these lockers, please secure them with a sturdy lock and remove your lock at the end of the class or practice.

Valuables should not be brought to school.







Reporting

Report cards are published in the MyEdBC Family Portal three times a year in the months of December, March, and June. Report cards are designed to provide assessment information in the form of a letter grade, work habits, number of absences, and anecdotal comments for each subject area. However, some teachers are exploring innovative ways of communicating student learning using e-portfolios and proficiency scales (as part of the SRPP – Student Reporting Policy Pilot).

Interim reports are issued for each subject at least twice during the school year in the months of October/November and January/February. Interim reports are meant as a progress report and focus on communicating a student's progress on their work habits in relation to the Cambie 3R's.

Parent-Teacher Conferences take place twice a year, after the first interim report and the second interim report.

Proficiency scale for assessment and evaluation:

Extending = Sophisticated understanding
Proficient = Complete understanding
Developing = Partial understanding
Emerging = Initial understanding

A mark of **Incomplete** on the final June report card indicates that the student should attend summer school to fill in learning gaps before moving on to the next grade level in that course. If a student chooses not to attend summer school, he/she will need to repeat the course.

A final June mark of **Fail** indicates that the student has failed to meet learning expectations and will not be permitted to attend summer school. The course will need to be repeated before moving on in that subject area.

Report cards may also include comments about a student's work habits (such as attitude, cooperation, participation, punctuality and teamwork) and their core competencies (communication, collaboration, critical and creative thinking, personal and social responsibility), which are all attributes of effective learning.

The Grade 8 program at Cambie is designed to meet BC Ministry of Education requirements and to give students a broad range of educational experiences. Grade 8 students are enrolled in a standard program comprised of seven prescribed classes plus one elective.

- 1. English Language Arts 8
- 2. Social Studies 8
- 3. Physical & Health Education 8
- 4. Mathematics 8
- 5. Science 8
- 6. French 8
- 7. Applied Design, Skills, and Technologies 8 (Home Ec./Tech Ed.)

Students spend time in the six Applied Skills areas of study: foods, textiles, woodwork, electronics, drafting, and metal work.



Core Course Descriptions

English Language Arts 8

The English Language Arts 8 Program is developed around seven principles:

- 1. Language and text can be a source of creativity and joy
- 2. Exploring text and story helps us understand ourselves and make connections to others and to the world.
- 3. Developing our understanding of how language works allows us to use it purposefully.
- 4. Purpose, audience and context guide the author's choices in the construction of text.
- 5. Language can shape ideas and influence others.
- 6. People understand texts differently depending on their worldviews and perspectives.
- 7. Texts are socially, culturally, and historically constructed.

Students will develop a basic understanding of the fundamentals of the English language, as well as develop and refine strong writing, listening, speaking, and reading skills. A wide variety of novels, short stories, and works of non-fiction will be used.

Social Studies 8

The Social Studies 8 area of learning spans from the 7th century to 1750. In this course, it is our hope that students learn more about themselves, each other, and the world we inhabit. The course involves Big Ideas about power, ideas, and change. Students completing this course will be able to recognize how the ideas and stories of various societies left a mark on cultures and landscapes, and will be able to see how these same patterns are present and active in their own world. By studying some of the many different cultures and ways of life that exist and have existed throughout the world from the 7th century to 1750, students will develop not only a deeper understanding of the differences between peoples, but also an appreciation for aspects of the human experience shared across time and space.





Physical and Health Education 8

The goal of this course is to develop the knowledge, understanding, and skills necessary to maintain a healthy lifestyle by remaining physically active throughout life. By providing opportunities for students to participate in a variety of movement categories, it is hoped that students will discover activities that they will enjoy into adulthood. Students will learn skills, rules, strategies, and etiquette for various games as well as appropriate social behaviors for working in team situations. In addition, students will learn about making healthy choices, building healthy relationships and advocating for the health and well-being of others.

Mathematics 8

The purpose and big ideas of this course are to enable students to understand that:

- Numbers can be represented in many forms and reflect different relationships.
- Numeracy helps us to see patterns, communicate ideas, and solve problems.
- Patterns allow us to see relationships and develop generalizations.
- Geometry and measurement empower us to make meaning of the world.
- We can apply mathematics to inquiry questions and use it to communicate information and data.
- Data enable us to draw conclusions and make predictions in an unstable world.

Throughout the course, students will be given opportunities to develop reasoning, analyzing, understanding, solving, communicating, representing, connecting, and reflecting skills while learning the content in the following areas: integers, operations with fractions, rates & ratios, financial literacy, square roots & Pythagorean Theorem, linear equations & functions, surface area & volume.

Science 8

Science 8 is a general science course that teaches scientific literacy, lab skills, and scientific inquiry methods that enable students to predict, analyze, and communicate information. The big ideas explored in this course include: (Biology) the cell is the basic unit of life; (Chemistry) the behaviour of matter is explained by understanding the Kinetic Molecular Theory; (Earth Science) Earth's geographical processes are explained by the Plate Tectonic Theory; and (Physics) energy is transferred as both a particle and a wave. Classroom learning activities that teach to the big ideas are selected to provide student opportunities to develop skills in critical thinking, collaboration, and communication.





French 8

French 8 focuses on basic French language skills to help students become more comfortable using the language in fun and practical ways. Emphasis is on building their communication and comprehension skills through speaking, listening, writing, and reading. Students will learn to ask and answer a variety of questions about familiar topics, describe people and personal interests, explain reasons for physical/emotional states, express basic beliefs and opinions, and recognize the relationship between French letter patterns and pronunciation. Students will practice these skills through daily speaking and writing activities, songs, games, skits, videos/movies, *Communi-Quête 1 (textbook)*, the Cahier Interactif and Duolingo. Each unit will conclude with a project in which students demonstrate their learning in creative and practical ways.

Applied Design, Skills, and Technologies

The teacher responsible will evaluate each "mini course" separately.

Home Ec. 8

All grade 8 This course is a part of the Applied Design, Skills, and Technology 8 rotation. The half-year module of Home-Ec 8 will include Food Studies and Textiles. Within Food Studies, students will learn how to prepare food safely, develop their basic food preparation skills, and learn how to select and use tools and equipment for the various cooking principles used. In Textiles, students will learn how to sew by hand and by machine; students will work on about 2 to 3 projects in Textiles.

Tech Ed. 8

Students will work in a variety of areas to develop and use technology, develop plans and design products within their ability. Learn about technical requirements of various careers and safety, the use of different materials and their possible use in the future. Areas looked at will be in Electronics, Woodwork, EDD (Drafting), Technology Design and Fabrication, and.

Fine Arts Elective Studies

Art Studio 8

Do you love to draw, paint, sculpt, and create...or maybe just improve your skills with some new and crazy techniques? Then this is the course for you! Art 8 is a "little bit of everything" course, and provides a <u>great</u> background for future art courses in Art Studio, Studio Arts 2D, Studio Arts 3D, and Photography. Projects include a fun variety of drawing and painting projects, collage, clay, paper mache, wire...you name it, we can create with it!

The Cambie art studios provide a creative, fun and supportive place for students to explore new skills and to enjoy and appreciate their own work and the creations of others. Come join the creative chaos!





Band 8

Anyone interested in playing a band instrument is welcome to take this course. While previous band experience if recommended (i.e. playing in at least one year of elementary band), it is not required. The band plays a wide range of genres, from traditional band pieces, to jazz, pop, and movie themes. Students will develop healthful playing technique, tone, music theory, and ear training. This group performs at the school and in the community throughout the year. Come make music with us!

Drama 8

Drama 8 is an active course that introduces students to the theatre. Topics covered are mime, voice, movement, improvisation, character work, playmaking, and performance basics. Teamwork, self-discipline, cooperation, and creative risk taking are stressed. Drama 8 builds confidence, improves public speaking skills, and collaborative skills. It's a fun and safe environment where students can explore their own creativity and story-telling potential.

Choir 8

Anyone interested in choral singing is welcome to take this course. No musical experience is required. Students will learn to develop their vocal technique through vocal health practices, voice projection, music theory, and ear training. If you can sing in the shower, you can sing in this choir. Sing on with us!

Guitar 8

This course is for students who have little or no experience on guitar. Students will develop skills such as finger picking, strumming, and chord forms. Students will also develop an understanding of music theory through playing rhythm, melodies, and chords. Students will be encouraged to improvise, compose, and perform solos or in small groups. Come learn to make and share your music with us!

Career Education 8 (all students complete off timetable)

Career Education 8 is designed to help you think about your strengths, preferences, and skills and how to develop and use these aspects in planning for your future life and career plan. Students begin to explore the concepts of potential preferences in their future employment, learning styles, interests, skills and what motivates them. This course will take most students approximately 30-35 hours to complete and will be completed outside of the regular classroom schedule through our online platform "MyBlueprint".





Support for Learning

At Cambie, we provide a variety of supports for our students to help them be as successful as possible. An integrated team of teachers, support staff, counsellors, and administrators support our grade 8 students. This team meets regularly to continually adapt the supports available to provide programming that is designed and delivered to focus on the needs of our students.

These supports can include services such as:

- a drop in learning center, The Cambie Commons, where students can receive extra support during class
- after-school math tutorials

Some students may also be offered a Learning Strategies block based on recommendations from their grade 7 teachers. Further information about this program will be provided to these students and their families towards the end of their grade 7 year.

English Language Learners

At Cambie, the English Language Learner program is offered to help students develop fluency and literacy in English, so that they will be able to be successful in the academic and social environment of regular classes. Students are programmed according to their language skills.

Clubs - Groups - Committees

There are many ways for students to become involved at Cambie. Joining a club, group, or committee is a wonderful opportunity for students to develop leadership skills, make new friends, and learn new talents.

The selection of clubs, groups, and committees varies from year to year depending on the interest of students and staff. A list of past activities, groups, and committees is shown below.

An activity called "Clubs Day" is hosted in the rotunda during one lunch break in September. Club coordinators set up tables and provide information to introduce their program so that students can learn about opportunities that interest them.

1st Responders – Students train in first aid, and provide first aid service to students.

Audio Visual Club - These students are in charge of the technical set-up for events at Cambie. They work closely with Student Council and the Rec Leadership class.

Brothers Helping Others – This is an inclusive group for male students in all grades. It allows students to support diverse opportunities to support the community.

Cambie Counselling Centre (CCC) Helpers - These energetic and active students are highly involved in key school events throughout the year. Some of these events include: the Post-Secondary Evening, Christmas Fundraising, Cambie Showcase, and Transition Activities. All are welcome.

Culinary Club - This club provides a place for students to practice and develop their cooking talents.

Dance Club - This club provides a place for students to showcase their talents through dance.

Friendship Club - Students meet several times a year during lunch to make crafts and to learn about different cultures. A fun and relaxing time for all!

Ecosavers Green Team - This club supports the school's environmental stewardship responsibilities.

Global/World Committee - Students who are concerned about world issues that affect our society are involved with projects like Aids Ribbon Day, the 30 Hour Famine, or sponsoring a foster child in a third world country.





Interact Club – Sponsored by Rotary, this club helps students work towards community service goals.

Library Club - These students provide an invaluable service by helping to keep the library in tiptop order.

Peace Club - The Peace Club organizes fundraisers for community charities and helps with school activities.

Ski/Snowboard Club - This club provides the opportunity for students to enjoy skiing and snowboarding on Cypress Mountain. It's a great way to improve your skills and make new friends. In addition, a one-day trip to Whistler Mountain is available for all interested students.

Student Council - One Grade 8 student will be elected in September to represent the Grade 8's on the Student Council. Other students can also be a part of the committee as a Memberat-Large.

Unity Club – This club provides a place for students to show caring for their fellow students.

Weight Training Club – This club is for students who want to become fitter and stronger.

Cambie Athletics

Cambie has gained wide acclaim for the large number of students participating in our athletic programs. There are many opportunities for both the recreational and high performance athlete. At Cambie, we stress teamwork, skill development, commitment, and sportsmanship.

Extra-curricular Sports

These are the teams that are involved in inter-school play. These teams may advance to a District Championship or South Fraser Zone Championship and potentially Provincial Championships. Divisions in inter-school athletics are determined by age.
